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Hebrews Chapter 11

Verses: 5-9; 11,12; 23-30

- 5 By faith Enoch was taken from this life, so that he did not experience death; he could not be found, because God had taken him away. For before he was taken, he was commended as one who pleased God.
- 6 And without faith, it is impossible to please God, because anyone who comes to Him must believe that He exists and that He rewards those who earnestly seek Him.
- 7 By faith Noah, when warned about things not yet seen, in holy fear built an ark to save his family. By his faith he condemned the world and became heir of the righteousness that comes by faith.
- 8 By faith Abraham, when called to go to a place he would later receive as his inheritance, obeyed and went, even though he did not know where he was going.
- 9 By faith he made his home in the promised land like a stranger in a foreign country; he lived in tents, as did Isaac and Jacob, who were heirs with him of the same promise.

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- 11 By faith Abraham, even though he was past age—and Sarah herself was barren—was enabled to become a father because he considered Him faithful who had made the promise.
 - 12 And so from this one man, and he as good as dead, came descendants as numerous as the stars in the sky and as countless as the sand on the sea

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- 23 By faith Moses' parents hid him for three months after he was born, because they saw he was no ordinary child, and they were not afraid of the king's edict.
 - 24 By faith Moses, when he had grown up, refused to be known as the son of Pharaoh's daughter.
 - 25 He chose to be mistreated along with the people of God rather than to enjoy the pleasures of sin for a short time.
 - 26 He regarded disgrace for the sake of Christ as of greater value than the treasures of Egypt, because he was looking ahead to his reward.
 - 27 By faith he left Egypt, not fearing the king's anger; he persevered because he saw him who is invisible.
 - 28 By faith he kept the Passover and the sprinkling of blood, so that the destroyer of the firstborn would not touch the firstborn of Israel.
 - 29 By faith the people passed through the Red Sea as on dry land; but when the Egyptians tried to do so, they were drowned.
 - 30 By faith the walls of Jericho fell, after the people had marched around them for seven days.

³² And what more shall I say? I do not have time to tell about Gideon, Barak, Samson, Jephthah, David, Samuel and the prophets,
³³ who through faith conquered kingdoms, administered justice, and gained what was promised; who shut the mouths of lions,
³⁴ quenched the fury of the flames, and escaped the edge of the sword; whose weakness was turned to strength; and who became powerful in battle and routed foreign armies.
³⁵ Women received back their dead, raised to life again. Others were tortured and refused to be released, so that they might gain a better resurrection.
³⁶ Some faced jeers and flogging, while still others were chained and put in prison.
³⁷ They were stoned; they were sawed in two; they were put to death by the sword. They went about in sheepskins and goatskins, destitute, persecuted and mistreated-

Amy Learns About Prayer

Read or listen to this story.

Once when Amy was a little girl she decided to test if God really answered prayer or not. She had a pretty pair of brown eyes but thought it would be much better to have blue ones, so she prayed for God to change hers to a blue pair! She felt very disappointed and upset when she looked in the mirror and found that her eyes were still brown. She started to doubt whether God could really answer prayers.

Amy's mother explained that "No" was an answer too and that God had answered her prayer in that way. Amy accepted the answer but still wondered why God had chosen to refuse her request.

Years later when Amy went to India she believed she found the reason. The Indian people Amy worked among were brown skinned and brown eyed. To show them that she didn't think she was better than them in any way, Amy began dressing in the sort of clothes worn by Indian women. At times, her work rescuing children from prostitution meant she had to disguise herself further by dyeing her skin brown too. She was very glad then that her eyes were brown, as blue eyes would immediately have given her away as a foreigner. She felt that showed how wise God was in saying "No".

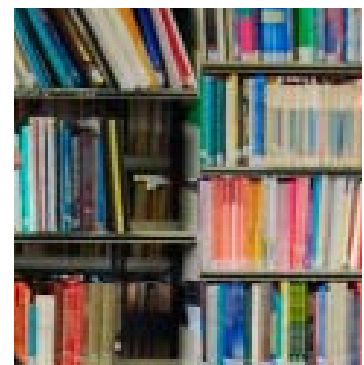

What Do I Need to Know? Task 2a



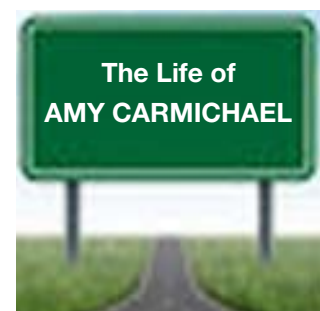
Work with a partner.
