### A Wheen o **Tunes**

Cecil Francis Alexander was born in 1818 in Dublin, she was the second daughter of Major John Humphries. The family



moved to Miltown House in Co. Tyrone in 1933 when she was 15. Cecil Francis enjoyed writing poetry as a small girl to share her Christian faith. She married Rt Rev W Alexander, the Bishop of Derry and Raphoe in 1850.



Cecil Francis wrote nearly 400 poems and hymns. published these for mainly for children. Some of them became really popular and are still regularly sung in church services today.

Some of her most famous hymns include 'All Things Bright and Beautiful', 'There is a Green Hill Far Away' and one that's become a Christmas favourite,

'Once in Royal David's City'.
