

Heartburn Stopper

Although not totally heart related, this famous Ulster-Scots is definitely worth a mention. Sir James Murray, 1788-1871, from Clunady, discovered a way to produce liquid magnesia and so Milk of Magnesia was created.

He patented his process and set up a manufacturing plant in Belfast. Waste products from his process were used to fertilise grazing land for cattle, who in turned produces good quality milk!

So, the next time heartburn strikes, remember you have an Ulster-Scot to thank for a quick cure!



Sir Robert Hart

Robert Hart was born in Portadown in 1935. As a young man, his sense of adventure drew him to China. He became a British Diplomat

and served as the Inspector General of China's Imperial Maritime Customs Service for 48 years. His work there modernised the system and helped to drive China's economic growth. He spoke fluent Chinese and truly loved the Chinese people, and they loved him in return! He was offered the role of 'Commander-in-Chief' of the Army by the Emperor, but turned it down as he felt that he served China better where he was.
