The Language | Tha Leid

Ulster-Scots Abroad!

[Leid is the Ulster-Scots word for Language]

As the Ulster-Scots moved across they globe, the language they spoke travelled with them becoming part of the spoken and written word in the places they settled. As over 200,000 Ulster-Scots (known in America as 'The Scotch-Irish' or 'Scots-Irish') settled in America in the 18th century, they influenced the development of the English language there.

We can see this quite clearly when we look at the words spoken by those in the Appalachian Mountains, and in particular around Pittsburgh. Words likes **clart**, **redd-up**, **neb** are a recognisable parts of speech. Hard 'g's are often dropped off the end of words (*bringing* is pronounced *bringin*); 'l' sounds more like 'w' (*called* becomes *cawed*).

Some Pittsburghers use **yinz**, **yunz**, or **you'unz** for you when there is more than one you. This comes from the Ulster-Scots phrase **yous/yuz yins** (you lot). You can discover more words used in America which have travelled from Ulster at the link above.
